


The **FALL 2018** enrollment of **24,390** on the Springfield campus was the highest headcount in Bear history.








FIRST-TIME UNDERGRADUATE BEARS TEST SCORES

Our average ACT scores were **higher than** the state and national averages.







Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

- The new **Bill and Lucille Magers Family Health and Wellness Center** offers quality health and
 preventive care at the heart of campus. The
 three-story, 39,000 square foot facility provides
 enhanced specialty services, including an
 on-site full service lab, primary care, a treatment
 clinic and mental health services.
- Completion of Phase I renovations at Robert W. Plaster Center for Free Enterprise built out approximately 12,000 square feet to accommodate expansion of the cooperative engineering program with Missouri University of Science and Technology. Phase II will provide additional design and research labs, distance learning classrooms, and tutoring rooms for fall 2020.
- The Hill Hall renovation benefits the College of Education and department of psychology with a modernized building with improved access, electrical and mechanical systems upgrade and improvements to lab, office and classroom space.
- Woods House Phase I renovations provided new finishes in all student rooms, replaced windows and improved electrical and mechanical systems building wide. Phase II will reconfigure bathrooms and include new finishes on the first and tenth floors for fall 2019. A new residence hall is expected to open to the campus residential community in fall 2020








BEAR COMMUNITY NOTES

The Office of Institutional Research (OIR) serves as a centralized resource to campus decision-makers and planners by providing an objective standard for determining the extent to which MSU achieves its core mission of educated persons, as well as determining the extent to which MSU achieves its stated goals.

The Bear Stats, prepared by OIR, provides data supplied annually for the purpose of state and federal compliance. These data are routinely produced by OIR and used to fulfill Missouri State University obligations to a variety of external agencies, including the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), the Board of Governors, a variety of federal and state governmental units, and rating/ranking publications.
